International Security

and Development is designed to educate responsible and competitive leaders of our globalised world. This innovative study program translates theory into the practice. The Jagiellonian University is one of the most prestigious universities in Poland and has a very rich tradition of academic excellence. The university is based in Krakow - a city known as a fantastic place to live and offering not only a vast range of opportunities to gain knowledge, but also a chance to meet students from all over the world. General information





International Security and Development (ISAD) is an international MA programme of studies addressed to students from all over the world who are interested in security and development issues. The programme provides not only theoretical, but also practical knowledge, as Polish and international academic staff and practitioners are part of our team.

ISAD aims at fostering creative thinking about complex problems of global security and development, as well as to equip students with analytical tools, language expertise, and cross-cultural understanding. It also helps gain professional skills needed for managing global security and development in an international environment.

6 scholarships

During the whole two-year programme, six scholarships are available for the top students. There are three partial fee waiver scholarships at the first year of studies for three students at the top of the recruitment list, and another three partial fee waiver scholarships at the second year for three students at the top of the list based on academic merits (GPA).







Academic Tracks

International Security

The aim of this academic track is to extend knowledge of the causes of contemporary conflicts and crisis response based on the analysis of empirical cases, as well as intercultural communication including different regional conditions in different parts of the world (Africa, Asia, the Middle East, and Latin America). The studies include analysis of non-traditional threats (hybrid war, cyberterrorism, international terrorist and criminal networks spreading, energy security, climate protection) and conflict management, peace building on many levels.







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The courses and modules we outline are divided into two major categories: mandatory modules prevailing in the first two semesters will give you a solid foundation in security and development studies. Academic tracks courses taught in the third and fourth semesters will provide more focused knowledge and competence in your chosen area. Apart from these, there are a number of optional courses offered every year.

Additionally, we offer a language course in one of the following languages: German, French, and Polish. Other languages may also be offered.

ISAD, as a two years programme, is divided into four semesters. Students need to complete modules worth at least 60 ECTS credits each year and 120 ECTS in total.



Entry requirements

Persons eligible to apply for the programme are the holders of a higher education diploma (at least undergraduate) in social sciences, humanities and other relevant fields.

Additional formal requirement is documented command of English language at least on the B2 level specified by the Common European Framework of Reference for Languages. At the same time, we accept a number of recognized language certificates. English native speakers or graduates from study programmes where English was the language of instruction are exempted from the requirement of the certificate.

Candidates are placed on the ranking list in order established on the basis of final result, expressed on a scale from 0 to 100, calculated as follows:

- 1. assessment of the motivation letter written in English (preliminary thesis project will also be assessed as part of the motivation letter) maximum of 50 points;
- 2. points awarded for reference letters maximum of 50 points.










Accommodation



We will provide you with support you might need in finding accommodation in a dormitory or residence. You can apply for accommodation at one of many Jagiellonian University halls of residence. Please note that the tuition fee does not cover accommodation or board.



You might also want to rent a room or a private apartment. Krakow is an academic city, and thus offers many options for private accommodation. Once you have arrived in Krakow, you will find that the process is not as difficult as it may seem. Thousands of foreign students live here and find housing within a few days of their arrival.





Practical information

Health insurance

All foreign citizens, regardless of the length of their stay in Poland, are obliged to hold a valid medical insurance. If they fail to provide a proof of an insurance in need of medical aid, they will have to cover costs of medical services.

Citizens of member states of the EU, Norway, Liechtenstein, Iceland and Switzerland who hold a valid European Health Insurance Card (EHIC) can get free medical aid in surgeries and hospitals funded by the Polish National Health Fund (NFZ).

Citizens of countries other than abovementioned need to provide a Polish consul with a proof of a medical insurance upon submitting their visa application. After they arrive in Poland, they benefit from an insurance policy obtained in their country, if the policy allows it. If not, they can sign an agreement with the Polish National Health Fund (NFZ) or with a Polish private insurance company.

National visa

Visa applications of Non-EU candidates are submitted to the Polish consulate in the country of residence of the candidate. You will need to include additional documents in your visa application, such as your passport photo, documents justifying the purpose of your visit or confirming that you have enough resources to support yourself during your stay.
